**This booklet has been updated by South West Community Matters in December 2020.** It includes current information on some of the funding programmes available but inevitably will not be able to cover all. Some funders have focussed on Covid related grants. These are specific to the current Pandemic and its aftereffects. They are however funders who will be introducing new programmes as appropriate and it is useful to have their contacts. Where possible we have included a telephone number in recognition of the fact that not everyone has access to the internet.

Accessing funding is not just about submitting applications to funders. It is also about having an organisation that is fundable. There are several agencies that can help and support groups and these are listed in the back of the booklet.

### **NOTE**

***As soon as you start compiling information about funding, things start to change. This booklet was accurate at the time of compilation but please do check with funders before starting any application as funding streams and contacts are constantly changing.***

## **FUNDING PROGRAMMES**

For now the funder focuses on funding projects and organisations helping communities through the COVID-19 pandemic.They ask organisations who are not looking for COVID-19 related funding in England to not submit an application at this time.(this may change.) All their resources need to be focused on helping communities through the pandemic.

They are reviewing the situation on an on-going basis and will share any updates or developments on their website.

Throughout the Pandemic, they have seen the sector rise to the challenge of supporting vulnerable children and young people across the UK. They have seen what is possible in an emergency and want to build on the changes made so far. This means They need to think about support in the longer term. They are currently gathering valuable feedback and insight from their COVID-19 Response programmes about the needs of the sector children and young people. They will use this to inform all their future funding activity. BBC Children in Need are planning to open two new funding

rounds in the next six months. The first will open before the end of the year, followed by a further funding round in Spring. These funding rounds will be open for applications for grants of £10,000 and larger awards of over £10,000. Please keep checking website for more details in the future.
